# A MESSAGE FROM OUR COUNTRY DIRECTOR

### Transforming Lives: PIN's Inspiring Efforts for a Brighter Future in Georgia

The last six months for Georgia have been very eventful. It has been a time of many changes, some of which are ongoing. Despite the spring protests last year, the end of 2023 brought positive news regarding the EU's recommendation for Georgia's EU candidacy status.

Last year was also challenging and busy for PIN Georgia's staff. After much hard work by PIN colleagues both in Georgia and PIN's head office, PIN was granted a project on reducing food waste and food insecurity for vulnerable populations in Georgia. This exciting pilot project will involve setting up a food bank in Tbilisi in a consortium with Georgia Red Cross, Eliots and Parki Ar Minda. The aim is to use collected food waste which is safe to consume for vulnerable food insecure people in Tskaltubo municipality. Thanks to the passing of the new food law in Georgia, PIN will work closely with partners and other key stakeholders both in government departments, such as the Ministry of Environmental Protection and Agriculture, FAO and food business operators to create a sustainable outcome on food waste in Georgia. We look forward to sharing our news with you on a regular basis on how this project is going.

PIN Georgia has also increased its efforts in supporting communities in Dusheti and the surrounding areas through its ongoing rural development project as well as two new projects focusing on a youth centre in Dusheti municipality and a social project. The social project focuses on sustainable development in Georgia's Aragvi region, addressing challenges such as outmigration due to limited employment opportunities. It involves support for schools, health service upgrades, youth awareness, gender equality, and economic empowerment through grants and capacity building. The aim is to enhance the socio-economic conditions in the Aragvi communities by collaborating with local civil society groups and local government institutions.

PIN believes that its long-term presence in the region as well as its holistic approach mean that we are very much in tune with the needs of local communities there and are a trusted partner. We are very much appreciative that the work we do here is possible through the ongoing support of the Czech and Austrian Development Agencies and hope to continue into the future.

Similar to the programme in Aragvi, PIN has also continued to provide support to families returning to Georgia from France with business development opportunities all over Georgia. Our staff members work tirelessly and travel all around Georgia providing one to one assistance to returnees to Georgia who have been given the chance to develop their own income generation projects, funded by the Office Français de l'immigration et de l'intégration (OFII). Cooperation with OFII has been very fruitful, and both OFII and PIN are delighted to continue this relationship throughout 2024.

I am also happy to remind our readers about PIN Georgia's media literacy project, funded by the Czech Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Apart from our engagement with the Georgian Ministry of Education, PIN has worked with local partners in Marneuli to strengthen communities' understanding of what media literacy is in our context and why it is important for them to use tools on media literacy in fighting against disinformation both internally and from sources external to Georgia. PIN's methodology, 'One World in Schools' is

globally recognised and has been at the forefront of efforts in Georgia to promote an informed civil society.

OWIS prioritises teacher training, benefiting students and enhancing local education systems. In Georgia, 60 teachers underwent training in the OWIS Methodology. The methodology uniquely combines education and youth initiatives, using films, discussions, and activities to engage young people. Beyond fostering active citizenship, it equips them with skills in journalism, digital marketing, algorithms, fake news, and propaganda, whilst encouraging an interest in human rights, the environment, media literacy, and topics centred on good governance.

PIN Georgia has also been very engaged in its humanitarian response for Ukrainian refugees in Georgia through two projects, SOS Ukraine and Resilient Civil Society and Media Respond to the Ukraine War, funded by DG Near. For Ukrainian refugees, PIN Georgia has worked to provide Multipurpose Cash Assistance (MPCA) to vulnerable Ukrainian families located in rural settings around Georgia with funding from PIN's internal SOS Ukraine donations. Through DG Near's generous donation, PIN has provided significant support for national and Ukrainian CSOs based in Georgia who are assisting Ukrainians with their own humanitarian projects. This project has served to build the capacity of the involved CSOs and to encourage them in finding other sources of sustainable income for their valuable work. The OWIS component of the DG Near project is a vital element of the project, providing support to 10 organizations, including 7 Georgian and 3 Ukrainian entities. The acquired skills in media literacy practices now empower them to conduct film screenings, workshops, and other educational activities. In the context of the hybrid war (both physical and digital), media literacy acts as means of navigation for Ukrainian refugees, ensuring they have access to accurate information.

Highlighting the project's significance, it gained recognition in the Czech Republic, particularly when Czech influencer Johana Bázlerová visited in November this year, endorsing its outcomes and bolstering awareness and support among the Czech audience.

Looking towards the future, the PIN team in Georgia has been developing its own country strategy for the coming years. To this end, we have held several workshops throughout the year, focusing on PIN's global Relief and Development Department (RDD) strategy. The pillars of the global strategy are civil society and inclusive governance, humanitarian (emergency) response and climate resilience. PIN Georgia, building on two decades of positive experience in the country, believes that it can contribute to lasting development for local communities across Georgia to cope with shocks such as natural disasters and challenges of climate change using the enhanced capacities of local civil society actors, including local action groups.

We would like to extend our warmest wishes to all our partners and express our gratitude to our donors, including the delegation of the European Union, the Czech Development Agency and the Austrian Development Agency who make it possible for PIN Georgia to continue our important work in the country. As the country director for PIN in Georgia, I would also like to convey my heartfelt thanks to our wonderful colleagues at PIN who show an unwavering commitment to supporting the growth of the country as well as supporting those vulnerable populations whose voices are not always heard.

### PIN TO ESTABLISH FIRST EVER FOOD BANK IN GEORGIA

#### Food waste project:

We are excited to launch an innovative programme dedicated to establishing the first sustainable food bank in Georgia. Our initiative will be piloted in the Tskaltubo municipality, with a primary focus on reducing food waste and enhancing the food security of approximately 1000 food-insecure individuals in Tskaltubo and its neighboring areas. Through the empowerment of Local Action Groups, Civil Society Actors, farmers, Food Business Operators, and consumers, our goal is to significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions, improve food security, and foster community-led initiatives aimed at minimizing food loss and waste.

The mobile centre is more than just a bus; it is a beacon of informal education, providing access to young minds in hard-to-reach localities. We're all about creating a space where young people can thrive and enjoy educational and entertaining activities.

But that's not all. Thanks to the Youth Agency, we've trained local youth workers to guide the way! They'll spearhead efforts to support socialisation, unlock potential, and involve young people in community life.

#### **AME'S COTTAGE:**

#### Where Love and Stories Meet

In the words of the renowned Georgian writer Goderdzi Chokheli, "Love holds the earth."

"Ame" is the affectionate term a grandmother uses for her grand-children and represents a home filled with love. This house, transformed into a family cottage by siblings Luka Bekauri and Sofo Bekaur, has been intricately woven into the history of Gudamakari Valley with the assistance of the Aragvi Local Action Group (LAG), the Czech Development Agency and PIN. Through traditional dishes and the sharing of the authentic yet fantastical world within these walls, visitors are invited to become a part of the same reality that has shaped the legacy of this unique place.





#### SISVI:

#### **Riding the Trail of Tradition**

In the heart of Gudamakari valley, brother and sister Nato and Tato are reviving tradition through horse-riding tours named after their beloved horse, Sisvi. Seeking to bring people closer to the mountains and the valley's essence, they believe in the transformative power of the relationship between humans and horses. Sisvi's horse riding tours offer a journey through the picturesque landscapes and a profound experience of Gudamakari's history, culture, and traditions. Through the rhythmic hoofbeats, visitors become part of a narrative that weaves the past and present together, creating an immersive adventure that leaves a lasting imprint on the soul.

#### **NIKOLOZ GUSHARASHVILI:**

#### Exploring Ksevi: Nikoloz Gusharashvili's Café Bar, a Harmony of Tradition and Modern Flair

On the road to Pshav-Khevsureti, nestled in the historical village of Ksevi, stands Nikoloz Gusharashvili's Café Bar Stumar-Maspindzeli, which brings tradition and modernity together. Established two years ago, the Cafe-Bar is near Akaki Shanidze's shop from the last century, where influential figures once gathered to explore the wonders of Pshav-Khevsureti. The guesthouse, a cherished visitor spot, combines traditional dishes with contemporary delights. Nikoloz envisions a future where the cafe-bar's building is complete, allowing winter guests to enjoy its warmth. A brewery is also in the works, promising locally brewed beer, and plans for a children's entertainment centre aim to make this cafe-bar a haven for families to appreciate the beauty of tradition and modernity.



#### SUPPORTING UKRAINIANS IN GEORGIA

As part of the DG NEAR-funded project "Resilient Civil Society and Media Respond to the Ukraine War", PIN delivered needs-based training and workshops to 14 CSOs supporting Ukrainians to strengthen their capacity to continue working after the project's completion. Organisations obtained knowledge in fundraising, researching community needs, and the importance of volunteering. Currently, organisations are working on their strategic plans and attending workshops on internal governance, which will support their institutional growth.

Since March 2023, around 1000 beneficiaries have received support from CSO service grants. The types of services vary: Georgian lessons for Ukrain-

ians, psychological support, informal education, employability training, food for children, legal consultations for Ukrainian citizens, and more.

Through the project, we supported 10 media organisations. With the grant money, they implemented their projects and maintained the sustainability of their organisations.

Oresta Osiichuk is a beneficiary of Revival, one of the CSOs that introduced a service provision grant within the "Resilient Civil Society and Media Respond to the Ukraine War" project.

#### **HEALING THE SOUL THROUGH ART:**

#### Oresta Osiichuk's Inspirational Story of Transformation in Tbilisi

In the heart of Lutsk, Ukraine, Oresta Osiichuk, a talented writer and the creative mind behind the captivating "AIHO" novel series, had achieved recognition in the literary world. She garnered accolades, including the prestigious first prize in the international competition "Coronation of the Word" and the "Best Debut" award from the portal "BaraBuka." Her star continued to rise when she secured the distinguished All-European Convention "Eurocon" award.

Oresta also wrote the mesmerising family saga, "Apricot Bookstore," which took Ukraine by storm in 2021, quickly ascending to best-seller lists. In 2023, her book was translated into Polish, "Morelowa księgarnia," with further translations, including English, to follow.

Unfortunately, life has its unexpected twists and turns. In 2022, Oresta found herself in Tbilisi, a world away from her Ukrainian roots. She arrived there with a heavy heart, grappling with devastation and confusion, struggling to find the motivation to continue. It was a challenging time and a crossroads in her life.

During these difficult days, Oresta discovered a way of healing and inspiration. She joined one of Revival's art therapy sessions, generously funded by People in Need. Art therapy, she hoped, would rekindle her strength and spirit

The art therapy sessions provided her with solace and a profound transformation. What began as an attempt to find herself and regain her motivation soon led to something beautiful. These sessions stretched to three hours, well beyond their planned one hour, and continued for three months.

During this period in Tbilisi, Oresta began crafting her next literary masterpiece. With the support of her peers and the embrace of vibrant Ukrainian community self-help groups, including the therapeutic art sessions, Oresta's life underwent a positive shift.

Even miles away from her homeland, the power to create and inspire flowed from her once again. She started to write children's stories, tapping into a well of creativity that had found new life. Art therapy, coupled with the support and camaraderie of fellow Ukrainians, has been her salvation.

Oresta Osiichuk's journey from confusion to creativity was not just a personal transformation but a testament to the incredible impact art therapy and community can have on an individual's life.



# FROM WAR'S SHADOWS TO ART'S LIGHT: EKATERYNA CHERNORAY'S FAMILY FINDS NEW HOME, CREATIVITY, AND CLOSE BONDS IN GEORGIA





Ekateryna Chernoray's family journey is a heartwarming tale of discovery, creativity, and community support. In 2023, backed by People in Need, she and her daughters participated in master classes, painting traditional Ukrainian Easter eggs – a unique celebration of tradition. As summer unfolded, they engaged in a master class on crafting "motanka" dolls, emphasizing psychosocial well-being, comfort, and community. These sessions built trust and connections among Ukrainian families through shared experiences.

"These classes weren't about mastering skills: they were about weaving threads of comfort and connection. We shared stories, learned about our culture, and compatriots generously offered their experiences and support. Together, we transformed from strangers into a community, fostering trust through joint creativity, especially with our children. Participating in People in Need-supported activities was not just a pastime but a lifeline, providing my children with friends and offering me comfort. The support in Georgia, where I am alone with my two young daughters, has been invaluable for finding a new home and connection," said Ekateryna. In Georgia, away from their Ukrainian home, Ekateryna's family found relief and healing from the wounds of war through shared artistry and People in Need's helping hand.

#### **EMPOWERING UKRAINIANS IN GEORGIA:**

#### Legal Stay and Business Registration Guidance for Ukrainians in Georgia





Due to upcoming deadlines regarding the legal stay of Ukrainians residing in Georgia or re-registering some of their movable properties, Rights Georgia conducted an information session to help. Law experts informed them of their rights and options, how and to whom to apply for business registration, the forms of entrepreneurship, and their pros and cons. Participants received the contact information for Rights Georgia in case they need indi-

vidual consultations or someone to accompany them to the state agency or court. "Rights Georgia is at the disposal of every person requiring legal assistance or representation, so I am always happy to collaborate with them", says Marta Bibilashvili, Country Project Coordinator, PIN Georgia. These information sessions fall under the "Resilient Civil Society and Media Respond to the Ukraine War" project, funded by the European Union and implemented by PIN Georgia.

### UKRAINE DISPLACEMENT CRISIS RESPONSE IN GEORGIA SOS UKRAINE PROGRAMME

### BRINGING BACK THE LIGHT OF HOPE: UNITE FOR ACTIVE SPORTS' INITIATIVE BRIGHTENS LIVES OF UKRAINIAN KIDS IN TBILISI AND BATUM!

The war-torn refugees from Ukraine encounter numerous challenges in Georgia, with the most significant being the enduring shadow of war that continues to affect their lives. Overcoming memories of pain and loss proves to be a formidable task. In our effort to assist Ukrainians in Georgia, PIN supported them in organizing various sports activities to help them for-

get the horrors of war and embark on a new life. Under these initiatives, 169 sports events were organized, engaging more than 300 Ukrainian kids and teenagers. Overall, these sports activities involved around 1335 people and contributed to their psycho-social support.














Under the SOS Ukraine Programme, PIN is actively engaged in implementing impactful assistance initiatives to support Ukrainian refugees in Georgia. Our focus revolves around four key directions—Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA), Cash for Rent Assistance (CRA), Cash for Medical Assistance (CMA), and a one-time cash assistance for kids. These initiatives are strategically designed to provide immediate relief, offering financial aid that extends across diverse regions. Each programme is meticulously crafted to enhance the overall well-being of supported families. 



## MULTI-PURPOSE CASH ASSISTANCE (MPCA)



The Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA) program covered a wide array of regions in Georgia: Imereti, Samegrelo, Guria, Racha, Adjara, Samtskhe-Javakheti, Shida Kartli, Kvemo Kartli, Mtskheta-Mtianeti, Kakheti. Beneficiary Demographics:The program successfully supported a total of 468 households, encompassing 1228 individuals.









### CASH FOR CHILDREN ASSISTANCE (CCA)



One-time cash support for children reached covered the following areas: Zestafoni, Karadjala, Bolnisi, Gurjaani, Kobuleti, Zugdidi, Poti, Kutaisi, Gori, Rustavi, Ahalkalaki, Marneuli, Telavi.

Beneficiary Demographics: This program specifically addressed the needs of 45 children aged 0-2 years old, ensuring that the most vulnerable and deserving young ones receive targeted support.



#### **MEDIA LITERACY**

#### **Empowering Minds: Promoting Media Literacy and Digital Citizenship in Georgia**



The media literacy project is being carried out by People in Need Georgia, with support from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Czech Republic, in collaboration with Radio Marneuli. This project aims to address various essential aspects of the digital world and has generated significant interest among students. More than 150 young people watched documentaries and engaged in discussions on media-related topics, such as how to protect oneself from fake information and the spread of photo manipulations on social networks. Additionally, they explored the influence of media and propaganda on individuals, the concept of digital citizenship, and the importance of being media literate. Through OWIS (One World in Schools) Media Literacy Workshops, young people in Georgia's Samtskhe-Javakheti and Kvemo-Kartli regions can attend documentary screenings covering journalism, digital marketing, algorithms, fake news, and propaganda. Participants engage in discussions and exercises to enhance their understanding of the media's role in everyday life and develop critical thinking skills.

#### Shaping Informed Classrooms: Media Literacy Workshop for Educators

The PIN Georgia media literacy project staff organised the "Media Literacy and Digital Skills in School Education" workshop in Georgia's Imereti and Adjara regions. More than 60 teachers attended. The aim was to introduce interactive teaching methods for high-school teachers and educators. "In modern education, media literacy and digital citizenship hold great importance due to the continuous development of technologies. In the 21st century, people, especially young people, receive information at a volume and frequency that was unimaginable years ago. This information shapes their beliefs, opinions, and knowledge, ultimately influencing their societal behaviour. Therefore, evaluating and critically understanding the information they receive is crucial. To promote media literacy in schools, we brought together high school teachers and representatives from educational institutions. PIN developed unique materials focusing on human rights and media literacy. During the workshop, we shared the OWIS methodology, which involves teaching through documentary films." said project manager, Teona Purtskhvanidze. We conducted the workshop using an interactive format, featuring the screening of Nicolas Veuli's documentary "Follow Me," which explores influencers and fake followers on Instagram. Following the film, there was an engaging discussion on the influences of digital platforms on society.
